"Soles Truncos" is the name applied to stained glass decorations often found in colonial houses in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

The literal translation of "soles truncos" is "maimed suns," or "half suns."

The play "Los Soles Truncos" is the story of three sisters from San Juan who engaged in a death struggle with the adversities of time: the past, which was a world of secure living, and the present, which is full of sorrow, hunger and poverty. Only their jewels and heirlooms remain to remind them of their past glories, and they prefer to suffer any privation rather than sever their last links to their past.

The three "soles truncos" which decorate the three doors of the set symbolize the three sisters and represent the tragedy of living in a world upon which only a "maimed sun" or a "half sun" shines.
